```
line = "Hello, world!"
print(line.split(","))
```

```
What does this code print?

# Iterable vs Sequence

## with open(filename) as myFile:

    with open(filename) as myFile:
        csvRdr = csv.DictReader(myFile)
        for line in csvRdr:
            print(line)

file_test("nino34.csv")
```

### Text Files

```
three = 3
with open("outputFile.txt", "w") as ofh:
    ofh.write(f"I am {three}\nyears from graduating")
```

#### What will first line in outputFile.txt be?

- A. Iam 3
- B. I am 3 \nyears from graduating
- C. I am three
- D. I am three years from graduating

Write a function that reads a CSV file containing daily temperature data and writes a new CSV file that includes only the rows for a given city.

Example input file:

Date, City, TempC 2025-01-01, Waterloo, -5.3 2025-01-02, Toronto, -2.0 2025-01-03, Waterloo, -8.5 2025-01-04, Ottawa, -10.1

filter\_city("temps.csv", "waterloo.csv", "Waterloo")

Output file:

Date, City, TempC 2025-01-01, Waterloo, -5.3 2025-01-03, Waterloo, -8.5

def filter\_city(input\_file: str, output\_file: str, city\_name: str) → None:
